Minister Paul L. Guy, president of the Greenville branch of the NAACP, said Bourey played an enormous humanitarian role when 240 Katrina evacuees came to the Upstate during the devastating hurricane a year ago.

"What has so impressed us was his compassion," he said. "He saw the need of the people and stepped to the plate to do it."

The Riley Institute is stepping up to the plate to do something about changing the mindset of how Upstaters think of race and culture, Guy said.

The Riley Institute is helping to orient CEOs and top managers about the need to embrace diversity in the workplace and other areas.

When Wachovia Bank gave \$500,000 to the institute this year, a bank spokesman said diversity is critical if the bank is to make inroads in the future. Guy said the Riley Institute runs "a leadership academy that would change people's minds."
