PROFESSIONAL ACCOMPLISHMENTS

National Peace Corps Association

2003--Present

President and CEO of national organization for individuals influenced by the Peace Corps with primary responsibility for board relations, strategy, management, program development, and resource mobilization.

- Developed an innovative seven-year strategic plan to capitalize on the upcoming 50th anniversary of the Peace Corps in 2011, including conducting the feasibility study, developing a case statement and assembling the leadership team for a \$20 million capital campaign.
- Developed and executed a plan to restructure governance and staffing systems to improve organizational efficiency, while increasing major donor contributions by 40%.
- Strengthened programs, simplified membership arrangements and improved infrastructure to enhance value proposition to a network of 140 affiliated groups and 90,000 individuals supporters.
- Created an advocacy program overturning an ill-conceived legislative link between Peace Corps and military recruitment and also generated a historic increase in Peace Corps's appropriation.

- Oversaw the design and execution of a pioneering research process with university partners reaching 125,000 workers in 45 factories in five countries, involving 7,000 interviews and 400 focus groups.
- Designed, developed and delivered high profile outreach efforts including frequent speaking engagements, publications, and website materials for public, private and nonprofit audiences.
