10:00-11:30 – C-SPAN in the CLASSROOM presentation by Pam McGorry, Education Programs Specialist – overview, resources, materials, information about C-SPAN internships, etc., and tour of C-SPAN facility.

See the daily front-page of each state's (and some major foreign cities') major newspaper on display outside the building on Pennsylvania Avenue. A 250,000-square-foot facility, the Newseum offers visitors an experience that blends five centuries of news history with up-to-the-second technology and hands-on exhibits. The Newseum features seven levels of exhibit galleries, theaters, retail spaces and visitor services. It offers a unique environment that takes you behind the scenes to experience how and why news is made.

9:45-12:00 – NATIONAL ARCHIVES AND RECORDS ADMINISTRATION, www.archives.gov *Constitution in Action* Lab conducted by Missy McNatt, followed by independent touring of Rotunda with original Charters of Freedom and other historical documents; Public Vaults with 1200+ records that fit into the five themes of the Preamble; Boeing Learning Center's ReSource Room for copies of historical documents, lesson plans and worksheets; see new Rubenstein Gallery holding the permanent exhibit, *Records of Rights* (www.recordsofrights.org), which focuses on the rights of immigrants, African Americans and women; visit gift shop – 10% discount w/teacher ID.

Go directly to guards, tell them you have a SPECIAL arranged by Congressman Clyburn and are to meet your PRIVATE guide inside. This is NOT a regular tour, it is a SPECIAL; RI private guide will be in the hallway/vestibule after you go through security and through the big, heavy doors.
